## Did You Know That ?

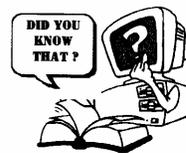

I have had several requests for these shortcut keys in the last several months. I used to hand them out all the time at my Computer Basics SIG and have even had them in the Homepage in the past. I use them all the time.

The **WIN** key is the one between Ctrl and Alt on the bottom of your keyboard. Just hold the WIN key down and tap the other.

WIN+R	Opens the Run program dialog box
WIN+M	Minimizes all of the programs so you can see the Desktop
SHIFT+WIN+M	Restores the minimized programs
WIN+E	Windows Explorer so you can move, copy, delete, or simply find files
ALT+F4	Closes program
WIN+BREAK	Displays the System Properties dialog box (yes even in XP)
WIN+F	Searches for a file (Search or Find)
WIN+F1	Starts Windows Help
WIN+TAB	Cycles through TASKBAR buttons
F2	Renames an item
F3	Find a File Folder
F5	Refreshes the list of files
SHIFT+DEL	Deletes an item without saving it to the Recycle Bin
BACKSPACE	Moves up one folder in Windows Explorer
CTRL+A	Selects all files in Windows Explorer
CTRL+ESC	Displays Start Menu <b>(The WIN key does the same)</b>
CTRL+A	Selects all data in a document
CTRL+C	Copies to Windows Clipboard
CTRL+V	Paste from Windows Clipboard into your document
CTRL+S	Saves document
CTRL+P	Opens Print Window
CTRL+O	Opens Open Window to retrieve an old document
CTRL+N	Opens a New Document
CTRL+B	<b>Turns on/off Bold</b>
CTRL+I	<i>Turns on/off Italic</i>
CTRL+U	<u>Turns on/off underline</u>
Backspace Key	Deletes character to left of cursor
Delete Key	Deletes character to right of cursor
END	Takes you to the end of a line
CTRL+END	Takes you to the end of a document
HOME	Takes you to the beginning of a line
CTRL+HOME	Takes you to the beginning of a document
NUM LOCK	Turns on/off numeric keypad

Once you start using these keys you will find them to be a big timesaver. I prefer using them over having to use the mouse to do the same things. Let your fingers do the walking!

## *In Memoriam*

Charles Bud Greenlees

March 17, 1917 – February 10, 2004

Bud Greenlees and two others, Chris Hubbard, general manager of his family's radio station WGYL, and Bud Holman, who was pretty savvy in computers and was using a computer in his family's business started the Vero Beach Computer Group around 1979. Bud had a burning interest in computers and it became a hobby in 1977. They started meeting once a month and used a wide variety of computers. The meetings provided them a chance to get together and discuss problems. They discussed computer basics on how different parts of the computer worked or how to write a program. In those days programs such as spreadsheets, databases and word processors were almost non-existent for small computer users. If you wanted a program, you wrote it yourself or typed it from a computer magazine. Most of the early users had floppy disks or tape recorders, which allowed them to save the programs for future use.

Milt Farber who was an early member of the group and chief engineer of Radio Station WTBF and Glen Dodd arranged for different meeting places until Eric Price, who by now was a member of the group, arranged to have the meetings at the Indian River County Library. He taught a computer class before the meeting in return for the meeting room. After about a year the group moved to St Edward Upper School where they met until around May of 1997. The group had grown to more than 100 and more space was needed so they moved back to the Library. They agreed to provide eight hours of instruction per month at the library patrons in return for the use of the meeting room.

They called the members each month to inform them of the meeting and with over 100 members this had become a laborious job. The group decided to send out a monthly bulletin instead, and Bud was designated to write the bulletin and collect donations for the postage, thus becoming the first Editor.

Bud was an officer of the VBCG holding several different offices throughout the years. He was on the board of directors where we would turn to him at each meeting for his invaluable advice. Bud was enthusiastic and always willing to share his computer expertise with others.

In December of 2001 Bud was awarded a Lifetime Membership in the VBCG. This award was long overdue and graciously accepted at the January 2002 meeting. We of the VBCG owe Bud a lot. He remained an active part of the group from the beginning.

# Bud Greenlees will be missed.

### CHILD PROTECTION

As a Computer Technician, I know the perils the Internet can hold for a child, and as a soon-to-be-father I am quite worried. I'm sure that I am not the only one who feels this way about the Internet and how it relates to children. The **Internet Content Rating Association** has made a great open source tool available to help parents combat Internet nasties like pornography and chat room pedophiles. The tool I am talking about is the ICRA Filter. This program will allow you to set up filtering rules titled "Other" to deal with alcohol, tobacco, drugs, and gambling. In the Services section you can block or allow specific services like newsgroups, e-mail, and IRC. If you are afraid that you are missing harmful Web sites in a specific area (e.g. tobacco), then try the Templates tab, where you can add content-specific filtering templates. My only problem with this application is that for some reason it thinks Lockergnome.com is a harmful Web site (as if!?), and that brings me to the last feature I would like to highlight, which is the Lists tab. In here you can add specific Web sites to the "Allow" and "Block" lists. This will ensure that your child can check out Web sites (like Lockergnome), while keeping them from viewing those Internet Nasties. My child may not be born yet, but I am prepared with ICRAfilter! You can set up the scale of your axes, add a function, and then you are left with a graph. You have most of the built-in capabilities of a graphing calculator, so you can insert a tangent or shade an area. What I like best about this program is that you can copy the graph as an image, which is great when writing reports, or for e-mailing to a friend, who is struggling with a particular equation. PTBSync is a tool to synchronize your PC time with an atomic clock via the Internet. It offers 65 time servers (NTP) worldwide from which to choose. The program can run as service on NT/2000/xp and offers support for DSL, international UTC time, and much more. In addition to time synchronization, PTBSync also includes a complete personal organizer for reminders and repetitive events such as birthdays, anniversaries, etc. (It can automatically calculate the age for birthdays or anniversaries.) It lets you create multiple recurring reminders or events, launch a file with optional alarm time, as well as popup messages before and after the event. If multiple users share the same PC, each one can have her or his own date entries. Additional features include support for holidays, complex scheduling, export to HTML, alarm sounds, support for daylight savings time, date display in the system tray, and more. At first, this program may not look like much, but once you have spent a few minutes with it, you'll be surprised how many useful and unique features and options it offers [MWA]
