EPEAT Lists the Greenest Computers

Criteria for EPEAT computers goes way beyond Energy Star.

Shopping for new computer? If you're interested in buying an energy efficient or green computer, one of the first places you should go is the EPEAT site (www.epeat.net).

EPEAT (Electronic Products Environmental Assessment Tool) is a registry of more than 1,200 green products—so far limited to desktops computers, laptops/notebooks, workstations and computer monitors—and managed by the Green Electronics Council. Though it was developed for "institutional purchasers" like the government, more and more it is being used by individuals looking for energy-efficient and green products. It is quickly becoming the de facto standard for green computing products.

All EPEAT-rated products must be qualified for the latest Energy Star compliance, which means it is about 20 percent more energy-efficient than similar products. In addition, an EPEAT-registered product must meet 23 required environmental performance criteria. EPEAT products are rated Gold, Silver or Bronze depending on the percentage of an additional 28 optional criteria they meet.

Add a Menu Bar Item to Eject a CD or DVD

An Eject CD/DVD menu item in your Mac's menu bar is a handy way to quickly eject or insert a CD or DVD. The menu bar provides access to its items at all times, so no matter what application you are running, no matter how many windows are cluttering up your desktop, you can quickly eject a CD or DVD without having to move windows around to drag its icon to the trash.

The Eject menu bar item also provides some additional benefits. If you have multiple CD or DVD drives, the Eject menu will list each drive, allowing you to select the drive you want to open or close. The Eject menu also comes in handy for ejecting stubborn CDs or DVDs, such a CD or DVD that your Mac doesn't recognize. Because the CD or DVD never mounts, there's no icon to drag to the trash and no contextual pop-up menu you can use to eject the media.

Add an Eject Item to the Menu Bar

1. Open a Finder window and navigate to /System/Library/Core Services/ Menu Extras.
2. Double-click the Eject.menu item in the Menu Extras folder.

The Eject menu item will be added to your Mac's menu bar. It will have the eject icon, which is a chevron with a line below it. If you click on the Eject menu item, it will display all of the CD/DVD drives attached to your Mac, and provide the option to 'Open' or 'Close' each drive, depending on its current state.

Position the Eject Menu

Like any other menu bar item, you can position the Eject menu to appear anywhere in the menu bar.

1. Press and hold the Apple/Command key.
2. Drag the Eject menu icon on the menu bar to the desired location within the menu bar. Once you start dragging the Eject icon, you can release the Apple/Command key.
3. Release the mouse button when the Eject menu is where you want it to be.

Apple Pro Tips—Tip of the Week

Have you come to dread a certain type of email? You know-the "what we did on our vacation" letter comprising a brief message and a jumble of attached photos?

Here's how to make quick sense of such missives in Apple Mail, using one of Leopard's new Quick Look functions

First click the Quick Look button in the header of the email.

All attached images now appear in a convenient and attractive slideshow. The icons along the lower edge of the slideshow screen let you play the slideshow, step through the images one at a time, view them simultaneously in a photo grid, expand them to fill your screen and add your favorites to your iPhoto library. You can also scroll through the images using your left and right arrow keys.

jGnash is a free (no strings attached!) personal finance manager with many of the same features as commercially-available software. It was created in order to make tracking your personal finances easy, but also provides the functionality required by advanced users. When first run, it'll take you through a quick wizard to set up a new account. It's a simple application where you can set up bank accounts, expense accounts, and income accounts. The bank account has a register that tracks credits and debts to determine the balance. You can change the look-and-feel and the themes in an instant. Be careful, because some themes make the menu item drop-downs invisible. It's a great application for anyone who needs to manage accounts and doesn't need bloated software. This is also good for teens opening their first checking accounts.

The Open Photo Project, Lockergnome Windows Digest

"Open source" describes a program where the source code is available to the general public for use and modification from its original design at no cost. The Open Photo Project follows a similar concept and makes photos available for use without lawyers jumping on you. You can read the license for all the legal stuff. The desktop page has photos for using as wallpaper on your monitor. Naturally, I clicked on "Computer" to view the photos under that category, and found cats taking over and pictures of computer guts, which aren't for the technically squeamish.

Apple has huge security update for Mac OS X

Apple patched 67 vulnerabilities in Mac OS X. Tuesday's update was the largest for Apple since March 2008.

Security Update 2009-002, which was bundled with the upgrade for Leopard to Mac OS X 10.5.7, and available separately for users of Tiger, plugged holes in BIND, CoreGraphics, Disk Images, Flash Player, iChat, Kerberos, QuickDraw Manager, Safari, Spotlight, WebKit and other bits and pieces of the operating system.

More than a third of the vulnerabilities -- 26 of the 67 -- were labeled with Apple's "arbitrary code execution" description, meaning the flaws are critical in nature and could be exploited to hijack a Mac. Unlike many other vendors, such as Microsoft and Oracle, Apple does not assign a threat ranking to the bugs it discloses.

Over half of the bugs were in open-source components or applications that Apple integrates with Mac OS X, including the Apache Web server and the WebKit browser rendering engine that powers Safari.

The security update can be downloaded from the Apple site (<http://support.apple.com/downloads>) or installed using Mac OS X's integrated update service. Leopard users, however, won't see the security update separately, since the patches were rolled into the Mac OS X 10.5.7 upgrade also released.
