A Brief History of Time—well actually just a brief history of the Vero Beach Computer Group

(As noted on the first page, we are coming up on our 30th anniversary! Any ideas how we should celebrate? Let us know.)

The Vero Beach Computer Group is a thriving community organization attended by enthusiastic computer users, beginners and experts alike. Created in 1979, the group was started by three people who had a burning interest in computers as a hobby and wanted to learn more about them.

The tiny group held their first meetings in a small office with barely enough chairs for six or seven people. Membership gradually grew, largely by word of mouth, and by 2001, when the Mac Users merged with Vero Beach Computer Group (VBCG), membership reached three hundred fifty.

The VBCG is a self-help organization for people who use computers, who want to learn more about computers, and who want to share their knowledge with others. Their mission is "to promote general interest in and information about computers and their use. Emphasis of the VBCG's activities shall be on the use of personal computers." The Group provides assistance and information on both Mac and Windows-based PCs.

"Our meetings provide the opportunity to get together and discuss our problems," stated Bud Greenless, VBCG Historian. "In the early days there were no standard operating systems. Spread sheets, data bases and word processors were almost non-existent for small computer users. If you wanted a program you wrote it yourself or you typed it into your computer from a computer magazine."

Thanks to a core of dedicated people and to the friendly, informative meetings, the VBCG continued to expand. Larger and larger meeting places were required and a monthly bulletin needed to be created when the former monthly phone calls to inform members of activities had become too laborious.

Informally organized at the beginning, by 1986 the VBCG became more structured, adopting by-laws, and electing officers. Throughout the years as more and more people attended the meetings and the various classes offered by knowledgeable presenters, larger meeting rooms continued to be made available to the group. VBCG has provided volunteer help for the computer section of the Vero Beach Public Library and donated three IBM compatible computers as well as a Mac.

Today this active organization has a website at www.vbcg.org and members can now print out their own copy of the newsletter. The Vero Beach Computer Group welcomes all who are interested in learning about computers and sharing their know-how with others. They extend a warm invitation to visit their website for more details.

The VBCG will be auctioning off some of our old equipment at the October General Meeting. Last month's newsletter had information about the Mac G4 laptop that will be auctioned off. This month, here is more information about the other items we plan to auction - Toshiba "Satellite" laptop with Windows XP Home Edition. Mac Pro Tip of the Week July 30, 2008 - Managing Your Login Items

Your Mac lets you decide which, if any, applications open automatically each time you log into your account in Mac OS X Leopard. For example, you might want iChat and Mail to open every time you sign on. These automatically opening programs are called Login items, and here's how to manage them.

From the Apple menu, choose System Preferences and click on the Accounts button. Click on your account name (if it's not already highlighted), then click the Login Items tab. A list of all Login items appears.

You can remove programs by selecting them and clicking the minus sign, or add new ones by clicking the Add (+) button and navigating to the desired application. If you check the Hide box next to the program name, the application will open automatically, but won't be displayed onscreen until you select it in the Dock or via the Command-Tab key command (which cycles you between all open applications).

Login Items don't have to be applications. You can also choose to automatically open individual documents, folders, or disks.

JetAudio 5 Basic is a full-featured media player with integrated CD burning and ripping capabilities. It supports all the popular media formats, including MP3, OGG, MPG, AVI, WMA and many others. JetAudio can also play DVDs and VCDs and act as your default player for all selected formats. Additional features include CDDB support, integrated lyrics viewer, Monkeys Audio support, skins, visualizations and just about everything else you'd expect from a multimedia player. An optional Pro version offers support for broadcasting and mp3PRO formats.

Monitor Calibration Wizard v1.0 [772k] W9x/2k/XP FREE, Lockergnome Windows Digest, 8-4-2003

This is a tool for calibrating the monitor colors. Most are too dark, too bright, or have a color tint like green or blue. Monitor Calibration Wizard can fix these problems. The Wizard in the name has two meanings: it's a wiz of a program, and it has a wizard to take you step-by-step through the process with help available throughout the process. You can create multiple profiles and customize one for each monitor to load when Windows starts. After the first go around, you can test it and look around to see how you like the display. If you don't like it, then go back and make more adjustments, retest, etc., until you're happy. Version 2.0 is coming soon, so be on the look out for more features. If you find you don't like it, you can go back to the default.

Using copyrighted music

A Lockergnome Windows Digest subscriber asks a great question about adding a soundtrack to a digital video: "I was just wondering... I'm getting ready to make my first digital video using footage that I shot with my digital video camera last week. "... I'm considering running a musical soundtrack in place of the sound on the video. Does anyone know what legal issues surround doing that? If I have to get permission or pay royalties to be authorized to use a pre-recorded song, can someone point me in the direction to obtain that? Thanks!"

Another subscriber offers a helpful article on putting music online -Putting Music Online

<http://www.commlaw.com/resources/pdfs/telecommunicationmemos1138.pdf> - and asks: "The biggest question is: What is your intent? Are you uploading a video of your family vacation for the grandparents to see? Or are you uploading a promotional video touting the strengths of your business? Are you trying to make money or not? That really is the biggest question you have to ask yourself before you proceed. If so, then be careful. If not, I wouldn't worry about it at all."

Still another subscriber offers this: "Anytime you use someone else's composition without permission, you are violating copyright and you open yourself up to a potential lawsuit. Even if you only use part of their composition, you are infringing."

The program runs automatically at startup and files are deleted to the Recycle Bin, so they can be recovered if needed.

Microsoft PowerToys For Windows XP

Microsoft PowerToys For Windows XP is a collection of utilities for WinXP. To get your hands on them, visit www.microsoft.com/windowsxp/downloads/powertoys/xppowertoys.msp.

You can download each PowerToy individually, and after installation, some of them can be accessed from the Start menu. Most, however, are simply added to Windows without much fanfare, so when appropriate, we'll tell you how you can access a particular utility. If you try one out and decide you don't like or need it, fear not: You can uninstall every PowerToy through Add Or Remove Programs.

Microsoft requires you to install and run the Windows Genuine Advantage validation utility before it will let you download any of the PowerToy applications. Also, while the PowerToys should work just fine on most WinXP systems, Microsoft doesn't provide any support for them, so if you need help with one (or in the unlikely event one messes up your PC), you're on your own.
